MINIATURE COMMUNITY WITHIN THE WALLS

Along with all of the larger pests that we regularly encounter, there exists an ecosystem of pests that live in small numbers throughout all large buildings in the Chicago area.

Both you as technicians and the customers might not ever notice that these pests are there.

This community consists of primarily 3 different insects - Psocids, Plaster beetles and Odd beetles. There are some other minor players in this system, but those are the 3 main ones.

Psocids, also called booklice, are so named due to being found amongst old books where they will feed on the natural glues in the bindings. They are extremely small, 1-2 mm, and need a magnifying lens to identify them. They appear as tiny specks along the edges of glueboards











Plaster beetles, also called minute brown scavenger beetles, are also small, but can be more readily seen with the naked eye. They are around 1.5mm in length. There are a few species in this family that are all about the same size and have the same habits. They appear as small brown spots along the edges of glueboards.

Psocids and plaster beetles, both feed on mold and mildew. They can exist in low numbers, feeding off of the small amounts of these fungi that grow in dust accumulations in cracks and crevices. It is when you start seeing large numbers of them, that they become an indicator of a moisture problem.

Then there is the predator living amongst them, the odd beetle. Odd beetles are one of the smallest members, 2-3 mm, of the carpet beetle family. They are called odd beetles because of the fact that the adult females remain what is called larviform and the adult males resemble an actual beetle.

As stated earlier, It is when you start seeing large numbers of psocids and/or plaster beetles that you then know there was some kind of moisture problem inside of the walls. The problem with using this as an indicator, is there is usually a couple of months of lag time from when the leak occurred to when the pests start to emerge from the walls. It takes that long for the fungus to grow, followed by population growth. It is when either the food source begins to dry up or the population just gets that big that you will see them. You will tend to see the odd beetles show up later, catching the larvae and the males on your monitors. Rarely do you ever see a female odd beetle.

A lot of buildings will see an uptick in these two pests in the summer after heavy spring rains. This will tell you that there were roof leaks or pipe leaks. Condensation on ventilation can cause mold growth as well, leading to an uptick in these pests.

Another example that comes to mind, we had an apartment building where a couple of tenants on the 10th floor had numerous plaster beetles coming from ceiling fixtures and then congregating around kitchen and bathroom fixtures. After thoroughly inspecting both units, we then inspected the units above on 11. It turned out that one of those units had had a leak pipe in the bathroom, which they had obviously repaired themselves, so maintenance was never informed. You could still see the extent of the water damage on the walls and baseboards. The treatment involved dusting in the ceiling of the tenants below and the walls of the unit where the leak was.

Inspection is key with these infestations, as with all pests. Finding the source of moisture is your best bet to ensure the problem does not occur again. Treatments with residual sprays and getting dusts into wall voids can help reduce the population, but you are generally only knocking down some of the adults. Most of the time it is a wait it out situation. They will eventually die off. Talking to the customer, explaining the pests and the cause, will go a long way towards easing their minds.



COMMUTE CASH CARD: UNLOCKING CONVENIENCE Metra





Do you travel by CTA, Metra, or Pace? Well you're in luck! Smithereen is now offering a pre-tax benefit for it's employees to pay for transit and parking costs. By using pre-tax dollars, employees can save up to 40% annually on their commuting costs. There are 2 ways you can participate: obtain the RTA Transit Benefit Prepaid Mastercard or use Ventra Direct Loads. More details on the two types below!

RTA Transit Benefit Prepaid Mastercard:

The RTA Transit Benefit Prepaid Mastercard is a reloadable prepaid card that can only be used for qualified commuter benefit purchases where Debit Mastercard, Maestro cards, and NYCE cards are accepted. Employees can use the RTA Transit Benefit Card at a station sales window, a ticket vending machine, or to make an online transit purchase only where transit products are sold. If the parking benefit option is activated, the card may also be used at CTA, Metra, and Pace Park & Ride stations as well as other qualified parking garages where the same types of card payments are accepted.

The RTA Transit Benefit Card is mailed after the 17th of the month, prior to the benefit month of which you ordered. The account is funded on the 19th of each month and the funds are available for use on the 20th of each month.

Ventra Direct Loads:

Ventra Direct Loads allows pre-tax funds to be directly deposited into an employee's existing Ventra account for use on the CTA, Pace and Metra (Metra riders can buy and display mobile tickets with their smartphones using the Ventra app only). Ventra accounts can be loaded with a pass products or select denominations in transit benefit value; the direct load will be available by the last day of each month.
